 Average percent of household income spent on healthcare, housing (includes utility and heating costs, etc.), and taxes & fees

Protecting the Vulnerable

- Percent of the population living below 200% of the Federal Poverty Level (FPL)
- Rate of homelessness/housing stability
- Kindergarten readiness
- Percent of the population with access to comprehensive healthcare
- Modernizing State Government
 - Percent of workforce trained in continuous improvement
 - Number of successful continuous improvement projects
 - Number of online transactions

- Technology and Cybersecurity




COVID-19 CHALLENGES

- Since March 2020, the State of Vermont has been in an extended state of emergency due to the COVID-19 public health emergency
- Unemployment in the state reached a peak of more than 16% in April 2020, and has declined to around 4% in September 2020
- The State has implemented many grant and assistance programs for residents and businesses
- The near term impact on the State's economy and population is uncertain



DEMOGRAPHIC CHALLENGES

- Vermont has a shrinking workforce, exacerbated by COVID-19
- A strong economy is key to creating greater opportunity for all Vermonters. By restoring Vermont's economic and fiscal fundamentals, we can work toward ensuring vibrant communities and a thriving economy in all 251 Vermont towns.




